Achieving Promotion to Full Professor Workshop

Organizer: Gretchen Peterson, University of Memphis

According to data from the American Sociological Association, women made up generally 55-60% of Sociology PhDs in the mid to late 1990's. Later data in 2013 showed that women made up nearly 55% of all faculty members in Sociology. However, the percentage of women who had achieved the rank of full professor was much lower at 10.7% for the social sciences more broadly. The percentages for women of color show even lower rates of representation among the ranks of full professors. While there are many factors that contribute to this poor representation, the purpose of this workshop will be to engage in conversation that

will demystify aspects of the promotion process and empower SWS members in navigating the process of achieving promotion to full professor. Some of the issues that we will explore are understanding promotion guidelines, preparing materials and narratives, and proposing external evaluators. The workshop is also intended as a safe space for discussing the difficulties of navigating departmental dynamics and dealing with the workload inequalities facing women and faculty of color. The workshop will serve a need identified by members of the Sociologists for Women in Society who have called for more support in achieving promotions to full professor.

Given our uncertain world, framed by a global health crisis and an uncertain political landscape, how can applied sociologists play a critical role in change-making efforts outside of the academy that can contribute to sustained movement building? This session will begin with a diverse group of speakers who will discuss the nature of their applied work, how they are able to bring an intersectional lens to contribute to progressive social change; why they have chosen to pursue applied sociology; the types of jobs they have held and topics they work on; the roles they play within their organizations; and what their actual work entails. It will also provide a space to support members in identifying the kind of skills they might need to pursue applied work, as well as how to tackle the applied job market.

- Students and educators have struggled to adapt to the changing educational landscape that accompanied covid-19 amidst the backdrop of social unrest. In addition to the stress of acclimating to courses going online, students report anxiety about isolation, job loss and financial burdens, and dealing with the school / work / home balance (Active Minds 2020; Top Hat 2020). The covid-19 associated stressors have been*

exacerbated by the racial injustices that gained national attention beginning in the summer of 2020, legislative attacks on transgender rights, women's reproductive rights and critical race theory. Combining tenets from trauma-based pedagogy and hooks' (1994) Engaged Pedagogy, we craft an approach to teaching and learning, which we dub the Pedagogy of Resilience; our approach recognizes student's wellness and safety as a requisite to learning in difficult conditions. To that end, we emphasize four cornerstones to facilitate student success: predictability, flexibility, connection and empowerment and provide specific instructional strategies to embed these elements in courses. Notably, the pedagogy of resilience pays special attention to African American and Latinx students due to the disproportionate impact of the virus in these communities and is sensitive to the burden of women and other caregivers during this time.
